






- > CDC
 - Will not pay for medication and labs
- Ryan White Program
 - Can pay for limited services for HIV negative individuals
- Medicaid
 - 19 states still have not expanded
- Private insurance
 - Co-pays are still expensive!





Current Status of State Medicaid Expansion Decisions



NOTES: Current status for each state is based on KCMU tracking and analysis of state executive activity. *AR, IA, IN, MI, MT, NH and PA have approved Section 1115 waivers. Coverage under the PA waiver went into effect 1/1/15, but it has transitioned coverage to a state plan amendment. Coverage under the MT waiver went into effect 1/1/2016. LA's Governor Edwards signed an Executive Order to adopt the Medicaid expansion on 1/12/2016, but coverage under the expansion is not yet in effect. WI covers adults up to 100% FPL in Medicaid, but did not adopt the ACA expansion. See source for more information on the states listed as "adoption under discussion." Family Planning Waiver



Eligibility Criteria


- Family income is at or below 194% of the federal poverty level (FPL)
- Must be capable of reproducing ages 13-44 years of age.
- Must not have had a procedure that prevents them from reproducing.
- Must not have Medicare, CHIP, or any other health insurance or third party medical coverage

Benefits:

- Family planning and related services
- One annual visit and up to three subsequent visit (not to exceed four visits per federal fiscal year.
- Effective January 1, 2015, beneficiaries enrolled in the Family Planning waiver demonstration program may have a prescription for contraceptives and/or medications to treat a sexually transmitted infection (STI)/sexually transmitted disease (STD) written by any Medicaid participating provider filled at their local Medicaid participating pharmacy.

Insurance Education and Assistance is a New Prevention Activity

 DIS, HIV linkage staff, and other frontline prevention staff are first touch to both prevention and overall health and wellness

Billing for PrEP

A 25 yo male presents concerned about condomless anal sex with another man and request an HIV test. MD notices that the patient is also due for a well visit this visit and performs it. MD Decides to perform a preventive medicine visit exam, spends 35 min counseling including PrEP and performs a rapid HIV test and serum creatinine. Patient has been vaccinated for HBV.

Assessing QHP Metal Tiers and OOP Plan Costs


QHP Metal Tiers	What It Means
Bronze	Plan pays 60% of costs (on average)/enrollee pays 40%
Silver	Plan pays 70% of costs (on average)/enrollee pays 30%
Gold	Plan pays 80% of costs (on average)/enrollee pays 20%
Platinum	Plan pays 90% of costs (on average)/enrollee pays 10%

Lower premiums, but less generous Higher premiums, but more generous

Priorities and Challenges

- Assisting people to apply for and enroll in public and private insurance coverage is an essential PrEP access strategy
- There are populations who continue to be uninsured;
 and there is no ADAP safety net
 - Undocumented
 - Low-income people who fall into Medicaid gap
 - Eligible but not enrolled
- Cost is a challenge, but by no means the only, or even the most significant, barrier to PrEP access



Financial Navigation Services

- MAP application fax: call to insure all documents received
- Income = pay stubs ok
- Notarized letters can be used as documentation-ask!
- Signature of Patient patient rep is guardian- not case manager, etc.
- Medication supply- ship to home or pick up at pharmacy/provider
- Assistance Denials: Possibility for Special Exceptions when denied

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Medication Assistance Program

 Gilead will provide Truvada for PrEP at no cost for individuals who qualify for the assistance program

Program Element	Truvada PrEP Medication Assistance Program
Eligibility Criteria	US resident, uninsured or no drug coverage, HIV-negative, low income
Drug Fulfillment	Product dispensed by Covance Specialty Pharmacy, labeled for individual patient use and shipped to prescriber (30 day supply); no card or voucher option
Recertification Period	6 months, with 90 day status check

- \$3,600 max/calendar year
- No income restrictions
- Covers co-pays, deductibles and co-insurance
- · 12-month enrollment, reapply
- Proof of US residence (utility bill, etc.)
- Not used with state/federal plans, such as Medicare (apply to PAF or PAN Foundation).

If the pharmacy doesn't accept Gilead's Co-pay Card, keep sales and pharmacy receipts. Call the number on the back of co-pay card. Submit paperwork for reimbursement for every refill.

- Income <400% FPL (\$47,080)
- Based on taxable income (1040 line 7, 1040 EZ line 1)
- Must be insured (as listed under "YES" above)
- Covers co-pays only
- Proof of US residence (utility bill, etc.)
- Case managers available to help resolve medical cost issues (800-532-5274)

- \$4,000 max/year, re-apply
- Income <500% FPL (\$58,850)
- Based on taxable income (1040 line 7, 1040 EZ line 1)
- Must be insured (as listed under "YES" above)
- Covers co-pays, deductibles and co-insurance
- Proof of US residence (utility bill, etc.)
- Pharmacies can bill PAN Foundation directly

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Paying for PrEP: Tips & Resources for Providers

- Education & discussion on financial processes
 - Deductibles
 - Prescription delivery choice/restrictions
- Manage expectations of time to obtain prescription
- •Insured- multiple pre-authorizations attempts
- Patient Assistance programs for Insured & Uninsured
 - •Insured: Co-pays & Deductibles
 - Uninsured: Cost of medications

- •Importance of Provider-patient partnership
- •Expect 2 weeks-1 month for complete process
 - Education on navigating the health care system & processes
 - •Timing of renewals
