## Mississippi Nigeria Education and Medical Exchange (MNEME)

In October 2017, four faculty members, several residents and nurses from the UMMC Department of Dermatology will travel to Nigeria for a four-week voluntary medical mission and education exchange in Enugu State. Nigeria is the most populous country in Africa, and one of the most populous in the world, with over 184 million people. There are fewer than 130 dermatologists and only two fellowshiptrained dermatopathologists practicing in the country.

Specifically, the mission of MNEME is:

- 1. Teach dermatology to medical students, residents, and other physicians, as well as serve as long term mentors to those who may be interested in pursuing a career in dermatology.
- 2. Provide free medical and surgical dermatological services to the most underserved and economically disadvantaged population in Enugu State.
- 3. Hopefully form a long term working relationship with the academic medical center/s in Enugu State, and make this a sustainable project that will be repeated yearly.

Maureen Offiah is a PGY-4 dermatology chief resident whose home country is Nigeria. She is the primary coordinator of this project. Dr. Offiah will be spending the month of October in Nigeria as her third year elective rotation, while the faculty and other team members will spend one week each volunteering.

# **Community Service Projects**

#### **Relay for Life**

The Department of Dermatology helped raise awareness and money for the American Cancer Society during Relay for Life April 28. Department residents, faculty and staff, along with members of the Dermatology Interest Group, joined together to raise over \$4,000 for the ACS.
