### **Matching Program for July 2015 Residents**

The Department of Dermatology is participating in the National Residency Matching Program (NRMP) for the first time, seeking the dermatology residents who will begin training with us in July 2015. We have had an impressive number of applicants to our new program, with 145 candidates applying for the two training spots

which we now offer annually. "Ole Miss" Dermatology has been discovered, there is no doubt! With the able assistance of our current residents, Drs. Kenneth Saul and Kathleen Casamiquela, the faculty narrowed their search to 32 of the applicants who interviewed with us December 2 and 9. We now await the Match results in March as eagerly as any senior medical student.

### **Melanoma Minute**

UMMC has developed a new multidisciplinary melanoma clinic at its Cancer Institute in the Jackson Medical Mall. The clinic offers "one-stop shopping" for patient convenience at the same time providing state of the art clinical coordination/continuity for all patients with melanoma or a history of melanoma, from stage 0 to stage IV. This endeavor brings together specialists from the Departments of Dermatology, Medical Oncology, Plastic Surgery and Otolaryngology.

"Patients are coordinated with the appropriate providers based on the characteristics of their melanoma," says William Black, M.D., a Mohs Surgery-trained Dermatologist who acts as the clinic's lead Dermatologist. He further explains that "someone with a melanoma in situ of the arm might only need to see me for excision, whereas someone with a deep primary melanoma will need Plastic Surgery to excise and perform a sentinel lymph node biopsy. Still another patient with metastatic melanoma may require a combination of surgery and chemotherapy. And of course all of these patients will need continued skin monitoring by a dermatologist."

A definite positive with this approach is that, in almost all cases, patients who need to see more than one provider are able to do so on the same day, making the sometimes tedious process of melanoma treatment and follow-up more convenient. However, according to Dr. Black, the greatest benefit to the patient is the continuity that such a clinic provides.

"It is great when Dr. Sheehan in Oncology can physically pull me in a room and ask what I think about a lesion or a particular issue. The providers are really able to put our minds together and come up with the best plan of care for these patients," he said.

Skip then opened his private practice in 1961 at the same location on Old Canton Road where he works today. One of the first residency-trained/board certified dermatologists in the state, Skip volunteered his time to teach resident physicians at UMMC for more than 34 years.

It is a privilege for all of Skip's friends to honor him in perpetuity for his passion, brilliance, modesty and affability. This distinguished gentleman and Mississippi treasure has touched us all.
